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## To the student

This book is for students who want help with English grammar. It is written for you to use without a teacher.

The book will be useful for you if you are not sure of the answers to questions like these:

What is the difference between I did and I have done?

When do we use will for the future?

What is the structure after I wish?

When do we say used to do and when do we say used to doing?

When do we use the?

What is the difference between like and as?

These and many other points of English grammar are explained in the book, and there are exercises on each point.

#### Level

The book is intended mainly for *intermediate* students (students who have already studied the basic grammar of English). It concentrates on those structures that intermediate students want to use, but that often cause difficulty. Some advanced students who have problems with grammar will also find the book useful.

The book is not suitable for elementary learners.

## How the book is organised

There are 145 units in the book. Each unit concentrates on a particular point of grammar. Some problems (for example, the present perfect or the use of *the*) are covered in more than one unit. For a list of units, see the *Contents* at the beginning of the book.

Each unit consists of two facing pages. On the left there are explanations and examples; on the right there are exercises. At the back of the book there is an Answer Key for you to check your answers to the exercises (page 336).

There are also seven *Appendices* at the back of the book (pages 292–301). These include irregular verbs, summaries of verb forms, spelling, and American English.

Finally, there is a detailed *Index* at the back of the book (page 373).

## How to use the book

The units are not in order of difficulty, so it is not intended that you work through the book from beginning to end. Every learner has different problems, and you should use this book to help you with the grammar that *you* find difficult.

It is suggested that you work in this way:

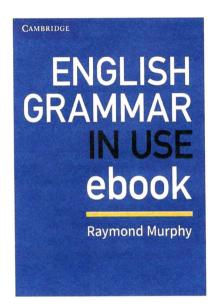
0	Use the Contents and/or Index to find which unit deals with the point you are interested in
0	If you are not sure which units you need to study, use the Study guide on page 326.
	Study the explanations and examples on the left-hand page of the unit you have chosen.
0	Do the exercises on the right-hand page.
	Check your answers with the Key.
	If your answers are not correct, study the left-hand page again to see what went wrong.
You	can, of course, use the book simply as a reference book without doing the exercises.

## Additional exercises

At the back of the book there are *Additional exercises* (pages 302–325). These exercises bring together some of the grammar points from a number of different units. For example, Exercise 16 brings together grammar points from Units 26–36. You can use these exercises for extra practice after you have studied and practised the grammar in the units concerned.

## To the teacher

English Grammar in Use was written as a self-study grammar book, but teachers may also find it useful as additional course material in cases where further work on grammar is necessary.

The book will probably be most useful at middle- and upper-intermediate levels (where all or nearly all of the material will be relevant), and can serve both as a basis for revision and as a means for practising new structures. It will also be useful for some more advanced students who have problems with grammar and need a book for reference and practice. The book is not intended to be used by elementary learners.

The units are organised in grammatical categories (*Present and past, Articles and nouns, Prepositions* etc.). They are not ordered according to level of difficulty, so the book should not be worked through from beginning to end. It should be used selectively and flexibly in accordance with the grammar syllabus being used and the difficulties students are having.

The book can be used for immediate consolidation or for later revision or remedial work. It might be used by the whole class or by individual students needing extra help. The left-hand pages (explanations and examples) are written for the student to use individually, but they may of course be used by the teacher as a source of ideas and information on which to base a lesson. The student then has the left-hand page as a record of what has been taught and can refer to it in the future. The exercises can be done individually, in class or as homework. Alternatively (and additionally), individual students can be directed to study certain units of the book by themselves if they have particular difficulties not shared by other students in their class. Don't forget the *Additional exercises* at the back of the book (see **To the student**).

This fifth edition of *English Grammar in Use* has been revised and updated. There are no new units, but some of the exercises have been rewritten or replaced.

An edition of *English Grammar in Use* without the Key is also available. Some teachers may prefer this for use with their students.

The book is sold with or without an ebook. The ebook contains the same explanations and exercises as the book. It can be used on an iPad, Android tablet, PC or Mac. Using the ebook, students can listen to examples, save their answers, take notes, highlight text, bookmark pages and use a dictionary.

## Present continuous (I am doing)

Study this example situation:

Sarah is in her car. She is on her way to work. She's driving to work. (= She is driving ...)

This means: she is driving now, at the time of speaking. The action is not finished.

am/is/are + -ing is the present continuous:

Ī	am	(=   <b>'m</b> )	driving
he/she/it	is	(= he <b>'s</b> etc.)	working
we/you/they	are	(= we <b>'re</b> etc.)	doing etc.



I am doing something = I started doing it and I haven't finished; I'm in the middle of doing it.

- Please don't make so much noise. I'm trying to work. (not I try)
- Where's Mark?' 'He's having a shower.' (not He has a shower)
- Let's go out now. It isn't raining any more. (not it doesn't rain)
- ☐ How's your new job? **Are** you **enjoying** it?
- What's all that noise? What's going on? or What's happening?

Sometimes the action is not happening at the time of speaking. For example:

Steve is talking to a friend on the phone. He says:



I'm reading a really good book at the moment. It's about a man who ...

> the time of speaking. He means that he has started reading the book, but has not finished it yet. He is in the middle of reading it.

Steve says 'I'm reading ...' but he is not reading the book at

Some more examples:

- Kate wants to work in Italy, so she's learning Italian.
  - (but perhaps she isn't learning Italian at the time of speaking)
- Some friends of mine are building their own house. They hope to finish it next summer.

You can use the present continuous with today / this week / this year etc. (periods around now):

- A: You're working hard today. (not You work hard today)
  - B: Yes, I have a lot to do.
- The company I work for isn't doing so well this year.

We use the present continuous when we talk about a change that has started to happen. We often use these verbs in this way:

getting, becoming starting, beginning changing, improving

increasing, rising, falling, growing

- Is your English getting better? (not Does your English get better)
- The population of the world is increasing very fast. (not increases)
- At first I didn't like my job, but I'm starting to enjoy it now. (not I start)

We use the continuous for things happening at or around the time of speaking.

The action is not complete.

## I am doing

past now future

We use the simple for things in general or things that happen repeatedly.

past now future

- Water **boils** at 100 degrees Celsius.
  - Excuse me, **do** you **speak** English?
- It doesn't rain very much in summer.What do you usually do at weekends?
- I always **get** hungry in the afternoon.
- Most people learn to swim when they are children.
- Every day the population of the world increases by about 200,000 people.

We use the simple for *permanent* situations (things that continue for a long time):

- My parents live in London. They have lived there all their lives.
- Joe isn't lazy. He works hard most of the time.

I always do something = I do it every time:

I always go to work by car. (not I'm always going)

I'm always doing something = I do it too often or more often than normal. For example:



I've lost my keys again. I'm always losing them.

I'm always losing them = I lose them too often, or more often than normal.

# Present continuous and present simple 2 (I am doing and I do)

We use continuous forms (I'm waiting, it's raining etc.) for actions and happenings that have started but

Some verbs (for example, know and like) are not normally used in this way. We don't say 'I am knowing'.

'they are liking'. We say 'I <b>know</b> ', 'they <b>like</b> '.
The following verbs are not normally used in the present continuous:
like want need prefer
know realise understand recognise
believe suppose remember mean
belong fit contain consist seem
l'm hungry. I want something to eat. (not l'm wanting)  Do you understand what I mean?  Anna doesn't seem very happy right now.
think
When <b>think</b> means 'believe' or 'have an opinion', we do not use the continuous:  I <b>think</b> Mary is Canadian, but I'm not sure. (not I'm thinking)  What <b>do</b> you <b>think</b> of my idea? (= what is your opinion?)
When <b>think</b> means 'consider', the continuous is possible:  I'm <b>thinking</b> about what happened. I often <b>think</b> about it.  Nicky <b>is thinking</b> of giving up her job. (= she is considering it)
see hear smell taste look feel  We normally use the present simple (not continuous) with see/hear/smell/taste:  Do you see that man over there? (not are you seeing)  The room smells. Let's open a window.  This soup doesn't taste very good.
You can use the present simple or continuous to say how somebody looks or feels now:  You look well today. or You're looking well today.  How do you feel now? or How are you feeling now?  but  I usually feel tired in the morning. (not I'm usually feeling)

You can say he's being, you're being etc. to say how somebody is behaving now:  I can't understand why he's being so selfish. He isn't usually like that.  (being selfish = behaving selfishly now)  'The path is icy. Don't slip.' 'Don't worry. I'm being very careful.'
Compare:
<ul> <li>He never thinks about other people. He's very selfish.</li> <li>(= he is selfish generally, not only now)</li> <li>I don't like to take risks. I'm a very careful person.</li> </ul>
We use <b>am/is/are being</b> to say how a person is <i>behaving</i> (= doing something they can control) now. It is not usually possible in other situations:  Sam is ill. (not is being ill)
Are you tired? (not are you being tired)

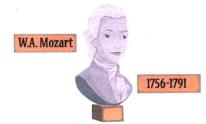

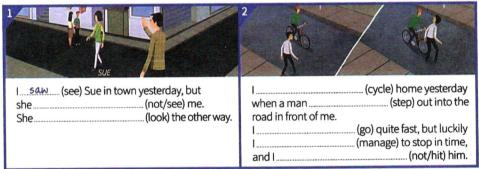

# Present perfect 1 (I have done)

A Study this example situation:



Tom can't find his key. He's lost his key. (= He has lost ...)

he **has lost** his key = he lost it and he doesn't have it now

have lost / has lost is the present perfect simple:

I/we/they/you have (= I've etc.)

he/she/it has (= he's etc.) done been etc.

finished

The present perfect simple is **have/has** + past participle. The past participle often ends in -ed (finished/decided etc.), but many verbs are *irregular* (lost/done/written etc.).

For a list of irregular verbs, see Appendix 1.

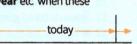

Is it raining? No, but the ground is wet.

It's been raining. (= It has been ...)

have/has been + -ing is the present perfect continuous:

We use the present perfect continuous for an activity that has recently stopped or just stopped:

It began raining two hours ago and it is still raining.

How long has it been raining? It's been raining for two hours. (= It has been ...)

We use the present perfect continuous in this way, especially with how long, for ... and since ... . The activity is still happening (as in this example) or has just stopped.

- How long have you been learning English? (= you're still learning English)
- Ben is watching TV. He's been watching TV all day.
- Where have you been? I've been looking for you for the last half hour.
- Chris hasn't been feeling well recently.

You can use the present perfect continuous for repeated actions:

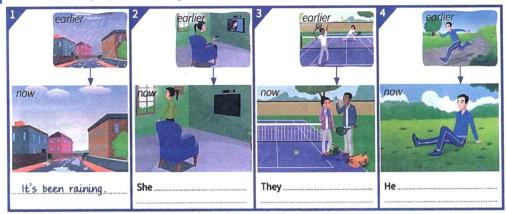

She has been painting her bedroom.

has been painting is the present perfect continuous.

We are thinking of the activity. It does not matter whether it has been finished or not. In this example, the activity (painting the bedroom) has not been finished.



The bedroom was green. Now it is yellow. She **has painted** her bedroom.

has painted is the present perfect simple.

Here, the important thing is that something has been finished. 'She **has painted**' is a completed action. We are thinking about the *result* of the activity (the painted bedroom), not the activity itself.

No, I TV since last weekend.

Yes, I a headache all morning.

No, I to the cinema for ages.

Yes, I to go to New York.

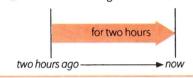
(use always / want)

# for and since when ...? and how long ...?

We use for and since to say how long something has been happening.

We use **for** + a period of time:

We've been waiting for two hours.



for a long time

six months

50 years

two hours 20 minutes five days

a week ages years

- Sally has been working here for six months. (not since six months)
- I haven't seen Tom for three days.

We use **since** + the start of a period:

We've been waiting since 8 o'clock.



since April

8 o'clock Monday 2001 Christmas 12 May

lunchtime we arrived I got up

- Sally has been working here since April. (= from April until now)
- I haven't seen Tom since Monday.

We often leave out for (but not usually in negative sentences):

- They've been married for ten years. or They've been married ten years.
- They haven't had a holiday for ten years. (you need for)

You can use in instead of for in negative sentences (I haven't ... etc.):

They haven't had a holiday in ten years. (= for ten years)

We do not use for + all ... (all day / all my life etc.):

I've lived here all my life. (not for all my life)

Compare when ...? (+ past simple) and how long ...? (+ present perfect):



- A: When did it start raining?
- B: It started raining an hour ago / at 1 o'clock.
- A: How long has it been raining?
- B: It's been raining for an hour / since 1 o'clock.



- A: When did Joe and Kate first meet?
- B: They first met a long time ago. when they were at school.
  A: How long have they known each other?

- B: They've known each other for a long time. since they were at school.

We say:

(= it is) or it's been (= it has been)

a long time six months (etc.) since something happened

- It's two years since I last saw Joe. or It's been two years since ... (= I haven't seen Joe for two years)
- It's ages since we went to the cinema. or It's been ages since ... (= We haven't been to the cinema for ages)
- How long is it since Mrs Hill died? or How long has it been since ... (= when did she die?)
